
having a ballroom

If the walls of this legendary Manhattan townhouse could talk, it would thank celebrity interior designers The Novogratz for bringing a riot of creativity and fun back to each of its sprawling rooms

Who stays here Celebrity interior designers Robert and Cortney Novogratz and their three school-age kids. They have seven children in total, ranging in age from 14 to 25. he Empire State Building. Hot dogs and yellow cabs. Carrie Bradshaw. New York City is synonymous with many things, but when you dig deeper into the individual neighbourhoods that make up the pulsing metropolis, you'll find one million more stories and icons that are no less important. Take, for instance, the historical home that celebrity interior design duo Robert and Cortney Novogratz have just spent two years renovating in the heart of Greenwich Village, a few steps away from Washington Square Park.

Greenwich Village, with its leafy streets and characterful brownstone buildings, is known for its vibrant past as a bohemian mecca for creative renegades and artistic trailblazers. When the Novogratzes purchased their 1826-built townhouse on Waverly Place in 2019, they were very aware the bubblegum-pink dwelling was once a spot where all sorts would gather to create and party. "We love that back in the house's heyday it was a salon for a creative and colourful group of New Yorkers in the arts, and that inspired us. The cultural history of the neighbourhood also inspired us, and the grandeur of the original structure brought all these aspects together," Robert explains.

Robert and Cortney, aka The Novogratz, have strong ties to New York. It's where they raised their seven children and established their design empire 25 years ago, which now encompasses high-profile projects and TV shows, product

ranges, pop-up stores and books. After living in Los Angeles for a handful of years, the couple were excited to be back in the Big Apple with their three youngest children, making it their permanent home again.

Due to decades of neglect, the interiors of the vast, crumbling building had to be stripped back to the studs. "We found it was falling apart, and we even thought it would collapse at one point," says Robert. "This was a true gut renovation." The seasoned designers navigated Covid-related delays, material shortages, and many design and building constraints tied to the townhouse's status as a landmark building with historical, cultural, and aesthetic value.

Working closely with the city's landmark committee and a band of trusted trades, the Novogratzes have created a home that ticks the boxes for family living and easy entertaining while retaining its historical integrity. The original window frames,

"The bubble-gum-pink stucco meant the home was an icon in the neighbourhood for many years," says Robert. "We loved the property's storied past and gorgeous bones." These include its high ceilings and big windows.



doors and millwork details were carefully recreated, and every wall radiates with a fresh finish, which could be anything from luxe plaster to statement wallpaper.

An internal elevator ensures easy access between the home's five levels, and the new daylight-soaked kitchen on the second floor features French doors that open to balconies overlooking the newly landscaped garden. On the rooftop, entertaining spaces take in the iconic city skyline, with views capturing the Empire State Building and One World Trade Centre.

Across the townhouse, vintage furniture blends with contemporary Italian designs and the Novogratzes' eclectic collection of modern art. Window dressings, rugs and bedding from their extensive eponymous homewares range add to the sense of cosy playfulness. "We love incorporating a variety of colours and textures in every room, so the whole place feels warm and inviting," says Robert.

With its original ceiling beams and epic proportions, the fifth floor has retained its status as the building's pièce de résistance. "Our favourite room has to be the grand ballroom," Robert shares. "It has 7.3-metre ceilings and a huge arched window overlooking Waverly Place. You can imagine all the grand parties and events once thrown here." The impressive scale of the space has been matched with a reclaimed fireplace mantel painted sunshine yellow and a series of feathered spherical pendants. The vintage sofa was reupholstered by the couple in a candy-pink fabric, as a nod to the townhouse's old exterior colour, which has been repainted a shade of ochre yellow selected by the landmark committee. "The pink upholstery was our way of paying tribute to the original facade," says Robert.

Now that the property has been lovingly ushered into the 21st century with a buzzy, artful splash of bold hues and



patterns, the Novogratzes are focused on maintaining the festive spirit of the storied abode. "This home was always a place for the arts and entertainment, and we want to keep that element alive in years to come," says Robert. "Our son, Breaker, and his band often play in the ballroom or on the roof deck, and we love to throw parties here for our friends when they visit New York. It truly is a magical space!"




